2 EU Member State government funding for nongovernmental organisations – trends and developments 2011-2016

2.1 Overall amount of government funding

No concrete numbers are available on governmental funding trends concerning non-governmental organisations (NGOs) working on fundamental rights. However the reports available give insight on the general amount of funding spent annually on the work of non-governmental organisations.

Funding for NGOs primarily comes from the Ministry for the Interior (within the budget referred to as 'UG Inneres'): a total € 50.9 million spent in direct funding (an increase of 339.2 % compared to the previous year due to extra funding for NGOs dealing with the refugee crisis and affected persons). In each governmental funding report, a list of funded organisations is available and includes organisations working on fundamental rights. However there are no concrete numbers on how much funding was given specifically. For comparison, in the years before 2015, the Ministry of the Interior spent: € 17.2 million in 2011; 7 € 21.4 million in 2012; 8 € 24.3 million in 2013; 9 € 14.9 million in 2014. 10

Out of the total receivers of funding from all government fundings given in 2015, 34.1 % are private individuals or organisations, i.e. non-profit ventures; however this does not only include NGOs. The percentage of overall funding from UG Inneres going towards private, non-profit institutions (as opposed to foreign institutions or public institutions) seems to have increased: 27 % in 2011; 31.3 % in 2012; 32.1 % in 2013; 432.6 % in 2014.

However, a report¹⁶ and two interview partners¹⁷ stated that accessibility to funding has decreased in the last five years, as has the perceived

availability thereof. More specifically, the report outlines that framework conditions for NGOs to receive funds are often bureaucratic and difficult, and there is a restriction in the funding of overhead costs as well as late government payments. At the same time, for example in the context of decreased government spending overall, criteria for funding has become more specific and the readiness of the government to fund NGOs not active in their fields of preference has decreased. In addition, both interview parters¹⁸ confirmed that survival in the civil society sector in Austria takes determinance and will, thus implying that the steps actively taken to enable NGO activity are limited (see Section 4 on further information). It can therefore be assumed that the perceived availability of funding is also rather low.

2.2 Distribution of government funding

There is no direct information available from official sources.

One interview partner stated that scientific research seems more likely to be funded than direct activities for fundamental rights implementation. Furthermore, the interviewee stated that 'experimental' and innovative projects and approaches are very unlikely to receive funding.¹⁹

2.3 Restrictions (or other changes) on NGO funding from other sources

In general, funding seems to have been cut down although more NGOs are claiming funds from the government and are even dependent on them – the process behind the allocation and amount of funds is not transparent.²⁰ Two interviewees stated that they were not aware of any direct restrictions on funding.²¹

NGOs are regularly invited to hold talks with government stakeholders and are invited to discussions. However, activities explicitly based on NGO input are rare or non-existent. Cooperation with NGOs is minimal, very selective and usually confined to information giving beforehand, or in an evaluation in hindsight. It must be noted that NGO representatives withdrew from the consultation process in February 2016 due to lack of progress and disappointment with suggestions submitted by the federal ministries.

4 Further information

NGOs seem to be largely based on perception with the criterion of being an institution with common benefit to the public. In Austria, there are several legal forms, most commonly a 'Verein', which is a registered association,

or sometimes a 'Stiftung', which is a foundation.²⁵ NGOs are therefore those Vereine and Stiftungen who deal with social, environment, migration and human rights issues. There are 425 NGOs in Austria. These are not mentioned explicitly and are not governed by a centralised government agency. There are no barriers or discrimination when it comes to opening a Verein in Austria, and no start-up capital is required.²⁶

The funding of NGOs (Vereine) is administered by local, regional and national authorities depending on area of funding interest and/or activity and is highly varied. There is no centrally coordinated funding mechanism, as funding remains at the discretion of political and administrative decision makers. The determinants of when and by whom structural or project-specific funds are allocated is not transparent, and no exact numbers are available. A report found that official fundings are often given in accordance with leading coalition party interests, as was echoed by an interview partner. This also influences the capacity of NGOs to advocate their cause.²⁷

Furthermore, NGOs active in the areas of women's rights, the environment, developmental aid or human rights often receive less public funding because of their distance to the establishment. Official statistics on NGOs therefore do not adequately reflect the importance of NGOs and their work in Austria.²⁸

It has been reported that NGOs lack the means to partake in public decision-making in general.²⁹

Finally, both interview partners stated that NGOs need to show a strong degree of determination and perseverance in order to be acknowledged and involved politically, as the government is neither pro-active nor facilitating in this realm. There has been little legal process and change in the past years.³⁰
