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1 National vaccine deployment – planning and overview of priority groups

The final version of the Czech vaccination strategy for COVID-19 was published on 22 December 2020,¹ but the specific timeline was only revealed on 12 January 2021 (slightly updated on 5 March 2021).² COVID-19 vaccinations started to be administered on 27 December 2020.³

The vaccination plan has been scheduled into two phases: the first phase focused on high-risk groups, medical workers, and essential workers, and the second phase on the general population. People in homes for seniors and the elderly, people on a long-term hospital stay, and essential workers do not themselves need to register with the central registration system as their employer or care home registers them upon request.

The first vaccination phase took place in the period between January and May and the second phase, when vaccination will be open to the general population, starts in June. Prioritisation was based on a score system, in which people over the age of 80 have the highest scores.⁴

Only minor changes with respect to the timing were made, no major changes occurred regarding priority groups.

The national vaccination strategy does not give a comprehensive explanation of the criteria that form the basis on which the priority groups were identified. After listing the priority groups the plan merely mentions that the prioritisation stems from the World Health Organization's recommendations (without giving a specific reference). It also claims that a similar approach was taken by the United Kingdom and Israel (without reference).⁶

2.1 Channels, means and measures to inform about the national vaccination plan

Access to information

Information on the COVID-19 pandemic and the pertinent measures, including the vaccination rollout, has been published in widely accessible language on a website set up by the government in November 2020. The website has an English-language version, although not all information is fully available in English. The website includes external links, for instance to a leaflet prepared in an accessible, easy to understand format by the Association for the Support of People with Mental Disabilities in the CR (Společnost pro podporu lidí s mentálním postižením v ČR). The leaflet contains information on the importance of vaccination, but it does not contain information on the registration or rollout as such. The leaflet is only available in Czech.

Information relevant to the pandemic and vaccinations is still published on the website of the Ministry of Health, but much of this information is conceived in overly formal language and/or not available in other languages than Czech.

Awareness raising

A national information campaign called 'Let's End This' (Udělejme tečku) was launched on 12 April and it will be implemented until September. Its main focus is the media, including social media, and in its initial phase the campaign has sought to address the elderly population segment. It aims to gradually encompass the general population. The intensity of the campaign will allegedly respond to the availability of vaccines and the population's interest in vaccination. The campaign is constructed around providing answers to questions regarding vaccination (in a FAQ style), and some of the issues are explained also in a video spot. Sign language interpretation is included in the video spots. The campaign is only available in the Czech language.

2.2 What are the (pre-) registration channels for vaccination put in place?

a) What registration channels for vaccination are in place e.g. websites, apps, hotlines/call centres, letters, via family doctors, etc.?

The main channel for registration is through the Ministry of Health's central reservation system, which is an online platform that connects people who want to be vaccinated to vaccination sites. The access site for the registration is only available in Czech.

b) Are any alternatives to digital access to vaccine registration in place e.g. appropriate support for those who need it (such as the elderly; those without access to the internet); physical locations for registration etc?

Registration for vaccination is possible for people who have difficulties communicating in writing (elderly people, people with a hearing disparity) via a telephone hotline (only in Czech).

The general population is encouraged to facilitate the online registration of elderly people.⁹

Since March, general practitioners can register their patients for vaccination, especially patients with mobility difficulties or patients with underlying health

problems. The practitioners may themselves invite patients to register or the patients may apply for registration.¹⁰

2.3 How are the vaccinations administered?

a) Where are the vaccinations administered e.g. vaccination centres, via mobile units, via family doctors, etc.?

Vaccination centres are the main sites where the vaccinations take place. Many vaccination sites are barrier-free, but the list of such sites is only available in Czech.¹¹ The City of Brno initiated the in-home vaccination of people with mobility problems over the age of 80 on 26 January. Persons who are interested in this must call the designated telephone number to register.¹² Vaccinations are also administered in the consulting rooms of general practitioners who chose to participate in the vaccination as described above.

b) For those being vaccinated - how is information about the actual vaccination process, the vaccine and any potential side effects provided?

Information on the vaccination process is provided mainly on the government website on the COVD-19 pandemic. The website contains information about the vaccination including the types of vaccines and the potential side-effects. The page is accessible in both Czech and English. The vaccination process is also described on vaccination campaign website and in a manual on the registration webpage. The vaccination side effects of vaccines (in general) is provided by the Minister of Health in a YouTube video.

c) Are there any circumstances where fees are applicable for receiving the vaccine – e.g. for third country nationals?

No fees apply. However, the first version of the national vaccination strategy suggested that those who do not qualify as a priority group would need to purchase the vaccine at their own cost.¹⁶

3 Challenges and promising practices

3.1 Challenges

Unequal access of third-country nationals not covered by public health insurance

Vaccines are available only to third-country nationals who are registered in the public health insurance system. Most third-country nationals who do not have a permanent residence permit are privately insured, and they are thus currently not eligible for a COVID-19 vaccination. EU citizens insured in the public-health system of another EU country are eligible, provided they have the S1 standard form.¹⁷

Limited possibilities for vaccine access for seniors above 80

According to a 2 May 2021 debate broadcast on the national public television¹⁸ 60,000 people over the age of 80 years who have already registered for the vaccination have still not been vaccinated, even though they are the highest priority group. Moreover, out of this number, 58,000 people have not even received information on their vaccination date.

3.2 Promising practices

No promising practices were identified.
