On 17 March 2021, a major change occurred when groups 10-12 in the first plan were changed into one large group 10 consisting of sub groups 10 a-10 d defined by an age interval instead of health conditions or staff in critical functions. Firstly, the Danish Health Authority (Sundhedsstyrelsen) based the changed vaccination deployment plan on the fact that age is an independent and crucial risk factor. Secondly, because of expectations of large quantities of vaccines in April, May and June there is according to the Danish Health Authority no longer the same need for a sharp distinction between groups of persons when only a few weeks will separate each group.¹¹

The basis for defining priority groups are the following three main objectives of the vaccination programme:

- 1. Minimising death and serious illness due to COVID-19.
- 2. Epidemic control and minimising the spread of COVID-19.
- 3. Securing functions that are critical to the stability and functioning of society. 12

2 Vaccination rollout – communication, targeted outreach, registration, and administration of vaccinations

2.1 Channels, means and measures to inform about the national vaccination plan

The government and public authorities have made use of press conferences that are simultaneously translated into sign language and online information on a webpage regarding COVID-19¹³, the webpage of the Danish Health Authority (Sundhedsstyrelsen), regional health agencies and municipalities etc. A list of publications can be found on the English part of the webpage of the Danish Health Authority.¹⁴ This includes a pamphlet on vaccination against COVID-19 that is translated into the following languages: Arabic, Bosnian, English, Farsi, Kurdish, Somali, Tigrinya, Turkish and Urdu.¹⁵ A letter has been sent out digitally to the public on 22 December 2020, and the letter is available on the webpage of the

Danish Health Authority in the same languages as the pamphlet. ¹⁶ On the webpage can also be found a poster on side-effects from vaccines against COVID-19 and two movies titles worth knowing about vaccines and can you trust what you read translated and with subtitles into the following four languages: Arabic, Somali, Turkish and Urdu. A list of hotlines and counselling is included on the webpage of the Danish Health Authority with information in English on a national hotline, regional hotlines, a hotline and e-mail for questions related to support on using the webpage for booking vaccinations and a joint corona hotline between The Danish Health Authority and the Danish Refugee Council offering counselling via chat or telephone in the following 12 languages: Arabic, Bosnian/Serbo-Croatian, English, Farsi, French, Kurmanji, Polish, Romanian, Somali, Tigrinya, Turkish and Urdu. ¹⁷

The Danish Health Authority (Sundhedsstyrelsen) has communication efforts directed at the public which among others aims at providing knowledge and giving instructions on how to act regarding vaccination against COVID-19. The Danish Health Authority makes use of different communication channels such as posts on Facebook, adds on social media etc.¹⁸

In the media, the Danish Medicines Agency (*Lægemiddelstyrelsen*) is cited for launching a large-scale awareness raising campaign regarding the new vaccines against COVID-19 whereby the Agency engages on social media in a non-judgemental way with people that are sceptical of vaccines against COVID-19.¹⁹

2.2 What are the (pre-) registration channels for vaccination put in place?

a) What registration channels for vaccination are in place e.g. websites, apps, hotlines/call centres, letters, via family doctors, etc.?

A website called www.vacciner.dk is in place for booking a vaccination against COVID-19. The website is available for persons that have received a letter (either digitally or by post) offering vaccination. The website is in Danish and English. Call centres are available for persons that are exempt from communicating through digital means.

It is noted on the webpage that the webpage is partly in compliance with the harmonized standard EN 301 549 on web accessibility.²⁰

a) Are any alternatives to digital access to vaccine registration in place e.g. appropriate support for those who need it (such as the elderly; those without access to the internet); physical locations for registration etc?

Call centres are available for persons that are exempt from communicating through digital means or lack the necessary skills. The municipalities also provide support to elderly people in order to help them book a vaccination time slot, transportation needs etc.

2.3 How are the vaccinations administered?

a) Where are the vaccinations administered e.g. vaccination centres, via mobile units, via family doctors, etc.?

Most citizens will be vaccinated in regional vaccination centres. Residents in e.g. nursing homes will be vaccinated locally. There are also mobile units particularly for citizens where a vaccination on a regional vaccination centre will entail great difficulties. These mobile, decentralized units are also used for vaccination at home, vaccination at pop-up centres, vaccination in nursing homes or other institutions. Such access needs to be agreed with the local municipality. Patients that are being treated at a hospital and on the basis of an individual assessment have a particularly high risk if infected with COVID-19 is offered a vaccination will be given the vaccination at the hospital.²¹

b) For those being vaccinated - how is information about the actual vaccination process, the vaccine and any potential side effects provided?

Information about the vaccination process is for most of the population sent either in a digital letter or by post. If a person is offered a vaccination through their workplace they will receive a message from their employer. When a person is eligible for vaccination they receive a letter in Danish either digitally or by post. In the letter there is a link for information in English. In the letter there is also a link to the pamphlet on vaccination against COVID-19 that is mentioned above under question 2.1 and which include examples on common and rare side effects.

c) Are there any circumstances where fees are applicable for receiving the vaccine – e.g. for third country nationals?

The vaccine will be free of charge for everyone that is offered a vaccine. Vaccines are offered to persons that have Denmark as their place of residence or right to vaccination services under a stay in Denmark under EU-law or international agreements.²³ Additionally, vaccination is offered to persons with a temporary stay in Denmark of an expected duration longer than 30 days unless the only purpose of stay in Denmark is vaccination against COVID-19.²⁴

3 Challenges and promising practices

3.1 Challenges

In April, media reported that citizens were having problems with the IT-system facilitating booking of timeslots for vaccination against COVID-19 and that the problems previously experienced with the booking system continues.²⁵

Prior to this, in February, the DaneAge Association (Ældresagen) expressed concern with the system for booking a timeslot for vaccination in place at the time. They reported receiving many inquiries from elderly citizens and relatives unable

to navigate in the booking system and in understanding the information being sent out. After the date of the letter from the DaneAge Association (Ældresagen), a representative of the Region Nordjylland – which is the public authority responsible for the website vacciner.dk where booking takes place – was quoted in the media for saying that the system for booking a timeslot for vaccination will be adapted. The Danish Health Authority (Sundhedsstyrelsen) also reported receiving many inquiries regarding a lack of available timeslots for vaccination and challenges with booking a timeslot for vaccination and that the Danish Health Authority was aware of these challenges. Therefore, it is not certain whether the system was adapted partly or wholly due to the letter from the DaneAge Association and/or people complaining or whether the public authorities was already aware of the issues.

3.2 Promising practices

In March, an already existing scheme for citizens in priority group (2) and (3) was expanded to included citizens aged 80-84 (priority group 7). Under the scheme citizens where a vaccination on a regional vaccination centre will entail great difficulties is given the opportunity for vaccination in their own home or at a local vaccination facility.²⁹ The Minister for Health has stated that the scheme is expected to continue throughout the vaccination efforts and will be offered to persons in other priority groups where a vaccination on a regional vaccination centre will entail great difficulties is given the opportunity for vaccination in their own home or at a local vaccination facility.³⁰

In April, the Danish Health Agency (*Sundhedsstyrelsen*) decided to pull-out the Vaxzevria-vaccine (from AstraZeneca) from the Danish vaccination programme against COVID-19 based on a link of very rare cases of unusual blood clots, low

blood platelet counts, and bleeding coupled with the fact that the COVID-19 epidemic in Denmark is currently under control and that other vaccines are available against COVID-19. 31 32
