
Freedom to conduct a business is one of the **EU's fundamental rights**.

Online tools and one-stop-shops are being used by Member States to remove excessive regulation and administrative burdens.

However, entrepreneurs often still face:

- long / complex procedures;
- time consuming reporting obligations;
- difficulties in accessing credit.

Some groups face additional hurdles:



- Farn less and confronted by prejudice.
- Inadequate support to balance family and work life.
- Gendered roles and stereotypes in society.
- Women



Young entrepreneurs

- Limited exposure to and practical experience of business environments.
- Difficulties navigating the complex systems and regulatory requirements in setting up a business.
- ← High start-up costs.



Migrants

- Obstacles to securing financial capital for starting a business.
- Cultural differences, discrimination, and problems in recognising qualifications, language barriers.
- Limited knowledge of legal requirements and regulatory procedures.



- ★ Limited independence and infrastructure needed for work.
- Difficulties securing adequate funding to start a business.
- Uncertainty about the financial consequences of setting up a business.

The EU and its Member States should further boost measures to facilitate the right to start a business while continuing to remove obstacles for all groups in society.
