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Case law:

On 10 November 2016, the Fiscal Court in Kassel revoked the decision of the tax office Frankfurt/Main and certified the non-profit status of Attac-Germany.¹¹ Attac-Germany is a non-governmental organisation, which, amongst other goals, promotes more effective taxation on financial incomes and big property.¹² In April 2014, the tax office Frankfurt revoked the organisation's non-profit- status, arguing that Attac-Germany followed political purposes, instead of the purposes named in their statute,

the latter of which were used to justify the organisation's non-profit status. The fiscal court followed the argumentation of Attac-Germany, stating that, in order to receive the non-profit-status, it was of primary importance that the purpose named in the organisation's statute was one of the purposes named under §52 Fiscal Code of Germany (AO - *Abgabenordnung*), and that the organisation adhered to these purposes. According to the fiscal court, political activities of Attac Germany were not a valid reason for the revocation of their non-profit status. Although the political activity was not amongst the purposes in line with §52 of the Fiscal Code of Germany (AO- *Abgabenordnung*),¹³ the Fiscal Code does not expressly forbid political activities in general, but rather intends that NGOs refrain from supporting political parties. The court emphasised that the organisation's political activities did not oppose to the non-profit status because they stood in the overall context of their non-profit-purpose and they were made public and transparent.

2 EU Member State government funding for non-governmental organisations – trends and developments 2011-2016

2.1 Overall amount of government funding

Unfortunately, a complete overview of the overall amount of government funding for NGOs working in the field of human rights is not possible. The allocation of resources within the federal budget is divided thematically, and the competences for these individual thematic fields lie with the federal states. The funding of themes includes resources for NGOs and state institutions.¹⁴ The specific shares are not discernible in the federal budget. The funding is mainly implemented through the Federal Ministry for Cooperation and Development (BMZ), the Federal Ministry for the Interior (BMI), the Federal Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs (BMAS) and the Federal Ministry for Family Affairs, Senior Citizens, Women and Youth.

Although the budgets of the individual federal ministries include various titles which also address the funding of NGOs, it is not always unequivocally visible whether a given sum is exclusively dedicated to NGOs, or in parts dedicated to the public sector. This was also confirmed

by the Federal Ministry for Finances (telephone call, 31 October 2017). A concrete figure of the overall budget and a display of developments between 2011 and 2016 regarding the funding of NGOs can therefore not be provided.

A reliable statement on the allocation of funds to NGOs can only be made regarding a few topics and for funding under the administration of the BMZ.

On January 1 2016, the guidelines for funding of projects of importance to development were adopted. The budget in 2016 amounted to twice the amount allocated in 2011. This funding refers to development cooperation, i.e. projects and programmes implemented in developing countries. Which aims at sustained improvement of the economic, social or ecological situation of the poor in developing countries, or effectively support self-help efforts, involving target groups as partners in the process of planning and implementation. These programmes may also aim to foster the fulfilment of human rights in developing countries.

"Live Democracy!" funds projects which seek to encourage democracy and prevent extremism.¹⁵ The programme operates on various levels, setting out to support projects with not only local, but also regional and supra-regional missions. Eligible for funding are pilot projects on selected phenomena of group-focused enmity and approaches to strengthening democracy in rural areas, as well as pilot projects on ways to prevent radicalisation. The programme also funds the "no hate speech"- movement in Germany.¹⁶

This subtitle was funded under the heading 'Empowerment of civil society' and was situated in the federal government budget.

Since 2010, this budget funds a federal programme entitled ‘Solidarity through Participation’.¹⁷ Until 2016, the programme focused on federal states in Eastern Germany, with the aim to improve a lively and democratic culture in local communities in economically underdeveloped and rural areas. The program aimed to improve the structure of civic engagement, the standard of living in rural areas and to support a democratic attitude. Since 2016, the programme has been expanded to fund projects throughout Germany. Initiatives and models which had proven to be successful in Eastern Germany were transferred to regions in Western Germany. Furthermore, various qualification opportunities were offered throughout Germany. The budget was therefore increased to an overall € 12.000.000.

2.3 Restrictions (or other changes) on NGO funding from other sources

Only one of the legislative changes implemented since 2011 could be classified as a restriction to the funding for NGOs through other sources (see schedule of costs under Question 1). It can otherwise be observed, that the recognition of the non-profit status for non-governmental organisations is gaining importance. Organisations face two challenges: First, they have to acquire the non-profit status in order to profit from the benefits of this title. Second, they have to make sure to keep this title, as certain conditions can lead to the title being revoked.

The non-profit status offers numerous tax benefits under Article 51 AO.¹⁸ According to § 59 AO¹⁹ organisations are required to pursue charitable purposes in accordance with § 52 AO and have to commit to this purpose within their statute. Revenues of these organisations are exempted from corporate taxes under § 5 Abs. 1 Nr. 9 KStG, as well as from trade taxes under § 3 Nr. 6 GewStG²⁰ and property taxes under § 3 Abs. 1 Nr. 3 GrStG. The non-profit status enables organisations to issue exemption certificates which donators can claim in their income taxes.²¹ This motivates many to donate, as donations will entail tax benefits. Next to tax benefits, the non-profit status can promote public subsidies, for example in the context of the programme '*Zusammenhalt durch Teilhabe*' 'Solidarity through Participation' (See above 2.1.d.)bb.).²²

The requirements to be recognized as being non-profit are listed under § 52 AO.²³ This paragraph lists 25 non-profit purposes. Only an organisation which fulfils one of these purposes is able to benefit from the status as a non-profit organization. According to §52, an organisation serves public-benefit purposes if its activity is dedicated to the altruistic advancement of the general public in material, spiritual or moral respects. Such purposes are, for example, the advancement of religion (Nr. 2) or the advancement of art and culture (Nr. 5). These strict conditions can impede access to the non-profit status.

While, under Article 52, NGO's have only 25 options to get the benefit, there are more than 25 activities, which can be dedicated to the altruistic advancement of the general public in material, spiritual or moral respects. For example, there is no specific category to cover the causes of organisations representing and promoting the interests of the LGBTI-community. The only option for these organisations to receive the non-profit status is to confirm in their statute that they follow the purpose of §67 of the Fiscal Code of Germany, which is to work for the combating of illnesses and epidemics. As a consequence, homosexuality is put on a level with illnesses.

Non-profit organisations undergo regular checks through tax offices. This includes having to proof that the purpose under § 52 AO continues to be met. It is often the case that political activities of the organisations lead to problems during these checks. The influence of the political decision making process or the support for a political party is not in conformity with the purposes under § 52. Worst case, the political orientation of an organisation can result in the revocation of the non-profit status. For example, in 2014, the non-profit status of Attac-Germany was revoked (see above). Although **the utilisation decree to the Fiscal Code of Germany**²⁴ does not specifically exclude organisations having an impact to the political decision making process, the tax office can nevertheless revoke the non-profit status if the political decision making process is the only purpose envisioned by the organisation.²⁵ Further examples for the problematic situation regarding the organisation's difficulties of maintaining the non-profit status can be found regarding the participation and/or call for demonstrations or public petitions.²⁶ This was especially relevant for environmental organisations (e.g. Greenpeace). According the principles outlined above, tax offices now recognise that organisations can engage in these kinds of political activity. More general political activities are however not covered by this principle.²⁷

In April 2014, the Federal Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs invited non-governmental organisations to participate in nine sessions preparing the new Federal Participation Law. A working group of 51 NGOs was established. After the consultation in the working group, the working papers were revised by the Federal Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs. In April 2016, a ministerial draft bill was submitted to NGOs, with the possibility to comment between 26 April, 2016 and 18 May, 2016. The Federal Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs has continued to offer NGOs more and more possibilities to participate in legislative procedures.

On 1 January 2016, in the context of the coming into force of the regulation for the furthering of projects of importance for development, 'bengo-Engagement' was appointed as central coordination and advise point for the Federal Ministry of Economic Cooperation and Development.³⁶ While the final decision regarding the allocation of funds to the individual measures, projects, and organisations still lies within the competence of the BMZ, the general management of the budget linked to the funds, including the preliminary selection and approval of funding applications was delegated to Engagement Global. Engagement Global has thereby become central contact point for all issues related to funding provided through the BMZ. The organisation acts as a central contact point for NGOs during the application procedure, as well as an advice centre, and also checks the allocation of funds for specific purposes.
