# 1 National vaccine deployment – planning and overview of priority groups

In Lithuania, national vaccine deployment plan or COVID-19 Vaccination Priority List¹ was approved by the Minister of Health on 23 December 2020. It has 6 amendments until 5 May 2021. There are three main priority groups in the Vaccination Priority List: (1) health care workers, especially those working with COVID-19 patients; (2) persons under high risk of being negatively affected by COVID-19 disease (older people, individuals with chronic disease, etc.); (3) key workers performing essential functions (social workers, teachers, firefighters etc.). Table 1 provides the information on the planned phases of vaccination for the prioritised groups.

In **Lithuania**, only minor changes of COVID-19 Vaccination Priority List were adopted by the Minister of Health from the beginning of January 2021. Three main priority groups (health care workers, persons under high risk of being negatively affected by COVID-19 disease (older people, individuals with chronic disease, etc.), and key workers performing essential functions remained the same all over the period. Though Ministry of Health adopted certain changes, national media criticised them. According to Lithuanian Radio and Television, COVID-19 vaccination process has suffered from a lack of clarity, insufficient vaccine deliveries, changing priorities and vaccination schedules<sup>2</sup>. There are no inclusion criteria such as vulnerability to infection, social vulnerability, multiple criteria stated behind the definition of priority groups in the COVID-19 Vaccination Priority List.

In late March, the Government of **Lithuania** changed its vaccination priority list and included the country's top officials as well as members of the parliament<sup>3</sup>. Lithuanian President and Prime Minister were vaccinated against COVID-19 publicly aiming at promoting trust to the AstraZeneca jab and COVID-19 vaccine overall. The Health Minister included top officials into COVID-19 Vaccination Priority List in 19 March 2021 in order to help boosting confidence in the vaccination process<sup>4</sup>. The list was expanded by including education staff, cleaning and catering workers, school graduates, mayors, and people with chronic diseases in March<sup>5</sup>. Supermarket workers were left out despite the initial plans to include them. Furthermore, police officers who operate within the system of the Ministry of Interior became the last group to receive COVID-19 vaccine before mass vaccination is rolled out.

## 2 Vaccination rollout – communication, targeted outreach, registration, and administration of vaccinations

In **Lithuania**, vaccination process is coordinated by local authorities – administrations of municipalities ('savivaldybės administracija''). Based on the current legislation regarding division of competences between local and national authorities<sup>6</sup>, municipalities are the founders of the majority of health care institutions on local level. Directors of Municipal administrations have appointed a local COVID-19 vaccination process coordinator (municipal medical doctor or other administrative staff) and health care institution responsible for coordinating vaccination process in each out of 60 municipalities. Every municipality has to follow COVID-19 Vaccination Rules<sup>7</sup> and COVID-19 Vaccination Priority List<sup>8</sup> approved by the Minister of Health. Nevertheless, each municipality has authority to decide upon channels, means and measures to inform communities about vaccination, define registration channels for vaccination and designate locations for vaccination station.

# 2.1 Channels, means and measures to inform about the national vaccination plan

Information regarding COVID-19 vaccination is provided on official websites of the Government of **Lithuania**<sup>9</sup>, local municipalities<sup>10</sup>, local health care institutions<sup>11</sup>, enterprises. The Ministry of Health initiated vaccination awareness raising campaign "Shoulder for a Freedom" (*Petys už laisvę!*). Short video and audio clips

were broadcasted via national media (radio, television and internet)<sup>12</sup>. The government and public authorities introduced national<sup>13</sup> and local<sup>14</sup> vaccination hotlines. Information about vaccination has been made available in different languages depending on ethnic minorities living in municipalities. For instance, information was provided in both languages Lithuanian and Russian in Visaginas municipality inhabited by large Russian population<sup>15</sup>. While in Šalčininkai municipality, where large Polish community lives, information was provided in Lithuanian and Polish languages<sup>16</sup>. In addition, information related to vaccination priority was provided by the Government of Lithuania via alert messages to mobile phones<sup>17</sup>.

# 2.2 What are the (pre-) registration channels for vaccination put in place?

In **Lithuania**, registration channels for COVID-19 vaccination vary in local municipalities. Registration channels for vaccination are following: websites, hotlines/call centres, email letters, family doctors, employers, health or social care institution<sup>18</sup>. There are alternatives for digital access to vaccine registration such as phone call for those who are in need for example, elderly or those without access to internet.

#### 2.3 How are the vaccinations administered?

In **Lithuania**, each municipality coordinate the vaccination process in their own way. According to the COVID-19 Vaccination Rules<sup>19</sup> there are (1) five national

vaccination centres which coordinate overall vaccination process in Lithuania, (2) health care institutions which coordinate vaccination process on local level and vaccinate people, and (3) health care institutions which only vaccinate people. Vaccination is executed in vaccination centres in health care and social care institutions municipal buildings or other public buildings such as sport or public event arenas. Information about the actual vaccination process, the name of the vaccine and any potential side effects is provided directly at vaccination centres, via internet or phone call. People are free to choose the vaccine manufacturer. The selection can be made from the manufacturer vaccines available at the vaccination centre at that time.

In **Lithuania**, national media announced<sup>20</sup> that foreign citizens will be eligible to receive the vaccine according to the age or priority group they are in. However, several conditions apply. According to the Lithuanian Government<sup>21</sup>, foreign nationals that are eligible to receive the vaccine include: all permanent residents in Lithuania, including foreign nationals and stateless people, people who are covered with the mandatory health insurance, EU citizens who have declared their residency in Lithuania and have registered at their local health institution. Both the vaccine itself and the vaccination service itself will be free of charge. Information regarding vaccination for foreigners is in Lithuanian and Russian<sup>22</sup> languages on the official website of the Government of the Republic of Lithuania. Information in other languages depends on local municipality decision. For instance, all information regarding vaccination is available online in Lithuanian, Russian, Polish, and English languages in Vilnius city municipality<sup>23</sup>.

### 3 Challenges and promising practices

#### 3.1 Challenges

In **Lithuania**, local media reported inequalities in access to and uptake of the vaccine for persons in the same priority group. Police officers that operate within the system of the Ministry of the Interior became the last group to receive COVID-19 vaccine before mass vaccination is rolled out. As a result, Lithuanian police set up 'roadblock' around government to protest vaccination plan<sup>24</sup>.

There was an incident of favouritism in accessing vaccines contrary to established COVID-19 Vaccination Priority List in **Lithuania**. Local media announced that an owner of a medical company in Šilalė, small town in western Lithuania, received the jabs for himself and his family that were originally allocated for the health care workers<sup>25</sup>. Mayor of Šilalė district municipality called the incident 'immoral'. The Health Minister and the mayor pledged to launch an investigation.

In **Lithuania**, local media published an article of European Parliament member Liudas Mažylis about discriminatory changes of COVID-19 Vaccination Priority List<sup>26</sup>. The EP member raised a concern about including teachers and other educational workers into Vaccination Priority List in prior position to persons in the age 60+. According to EP member it may violate fundamental human rights and EU Vaccines Strategy. The Prime Minister argued that the change of Vaccination Priority List was implemented due to the lack of those willing to be vaccinated (notably by AstraZeneca vaccine) among elderly people<sup>27</sup>.

### 3.2 Promising practices

In **Lithuania**, vaccination is carried out in vaccination centres which are located in every municipality across the whole country. People can choose the most convenient vaccination centre in municipality of their place of residence. However, some people in vulnerable situations are facing difficulties in accessing health and vaccination services. COVID-19 Vaccination Rules<sup>28</sup> approved by the Minister of

Health allows vaccination at home for those who are in need. Health care institutions which are executing COVID-19 vaccination offer transportation services for those who are not able to come to vaccination centres. In addition, vaccination centres have a mobile vaccine team which provide services at home. Vaccination at home service is ordered by using ordinary registration procedure<sup>29</sup>. As a result, these people have the equal rights to health like the other.
