#### Please cite any relevant sources

- a) The national minimum standard for cell space is (with a margin of deviation of 10%) a floor area of 10 square meters, a width of 2 meters and a height of 2.5 meters. This standard is laid down in article 3 of the ministerial decree 'Rules on requirements accommodations penal institutions' (*Regeling eisen verblijfsruimte penitentiaire inrichtingen*).¹ The legal basis of this decree is article 16, subsection 5, of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) which allows the Minister of Justice and Security to lay down rules concerning the requirements that a cell accommodation must satisfy.²
- b) The national minimum standard concerning cell space is not applicable to penal institutions with a very limited security (*Zeer Beperkt Beveiligde Inrichtingen*) or a limited security (*Beperkt Beveiligde Inrichtingen*). <sup>3</sup> The Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) distinguishes between five types of penal institutions with increasing degrees of security: institutions with a very limited security; institutions with a limited security; institutions with a normal security; institutions with an extensive security; institutions with extra security. <sup>4</sup> The national minimum standard for cell space of 10 square meters, a width of 2 meters and a height of 2.5 meters only applies for penal institutions institutions with a normal security; institutions with an extensive security; institutions with extra security. Article 12, subsection 3 of the ministerial decree 'Rules on requirements accommodations penal institutions' stipulates that for these instutions accommodation spaces are designed and arranged in such a way that they offer the individual detainee sufficient space, daylight, heating and ventilation. <sup>5</sup>

The legal basis of this decree is article

- 16, subsection 5, of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) which allows the Minister of Justice and Security to lay down rules concerning the requirements that a cell accommodation must satisfy.<sup>11</sup>
- c) The provision of sanitary facilities is regulated by article 9 of the ministerial decree 'Rules on requirements accommodations penal institutions' (*Regeling eisen verblijfsruimte penitentiaire inrichtingen*). <sup>12</sup> The legal basis of this decree is article 16, subsection 5, of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) which allows the Minister of Justice and Security to lay down rules concerning the requirements that a cell accommodation must satisfy. <sup>13</sup>
- d) The national minimum standard concerning sanitary facilities is not applicable to penal institutions with a limited security (*Beperkt Beveiligde Inrichtingen*). <sup>14</sup> Article 12, subsection 4 of the ministerial decree 'Rules on requirements accomodations penal institutions' (*Regeling eisen verblijfsruimte penitentiaire inrichtingen*) stipulates that in case the accommodation spaces in penal institutions with a limited security do no have sanitary facilities (toilet, washing area) then it is sufficiently available elsewhere in the building. <sup>15</sup>
- e) Reports of the National Preventive mechanisms covering the years 2015<sup>16</sup> and 2016 <sup>17</sup> do no contain any information or recommendations on sanitary facilities.

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a) The national minimum standard prisoners can spent outdoors is one hour each day. This standard is set by article 49, subsection 3 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*). <sup>18</sup> This standard also applies for prisoners in solitary confinement and prisoners a punishment cell. The national minumum standard for time spent indoors in the common area is six hours a week for recreation purposes. This standard is set by article 49, subsection 2 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*). <sup>19</sup> These are minimal standards set by the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*). Article 48, subsection 2 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) entitles each prisoner to physical exercise and practice of sports for a minimum period of twice three quarters of an hour per week. <sup>20</sup>

The Penitentiary Order (*Penitentiaire maatregel*), a General Adminstrative Order (*Algemene maatregel van Bestuur*) which implements part of the Penitentiary Principles Act, stipulates that a day programme of activities and visits should be available to prisoners. The Penitentiary Order differentiaties between two types of day programmes: one for prisoners in unrestricted association, and one for prisoners in restricted association. <sup>21</sup> The day programme for prisoners in unrestricted association has a minimum duration of 59 hours a week and includes activities and visits. <sup>22</sup> The day programme for prisoners in restricted association consists of activities and visits lasting btween 18 and 63 hours a week. <sup>23</sup>

b) Sports and other recreational and educational facilities are available. Each penitentiary institution has a set of house rules in which the content of the day programmes is laid down. The ministerial decree 'Regulations on Model House Rules for Penitentairy Inistution (*Regeling model huisregels penitentiaire inrichtingen*) gives a model for these house rules. <sup>24</sup> It stipulates the following activoties of which a day programme consists (*programma-onderdelen*): airing; labour; physical exercise and or sport; education; recreation; library; shopping; visits; making telephone calls; contacts with the media.

- c) Time spent in prison is regulated by the following legal instruments: Penitentiary Principles Act (Penitentiaire beginselenwet) <sup>25</sup>; The Penitentiary Order (Penitentiaire maatregel) <sup>26</sup>; Regulations on Model House Rules for Penitentairy Inistution (Regeling model huisregels penitentiaire inrichtingen) <sup>27</sup>; and Regulation for Selection, Placement and Transfer of Prisoners (Regeling selectie, plaatsing en overplaatsing van gedetineerden) 28.
- d) Different standards are applicable to different regimes. As already mentioned above, the day programme for prisoners in unrestricted association <sup>29</sup> is different from the day programme for prisoners in restricted association. 30 Article 19 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (Penitentiaire beginselenwet) stipulates that for each prisoner a custodial sentence or detention order shall be carried out in an institution in unrestricted or restricted association, unless placing in an individual regime is required.<sup>31</sup> Prisoners placed in an individual regime are not entitled to the same programmes as prisoners or prisoners in restricted association. The governor of the penitentiary institutution decides the extent to to which the prisoner is allowed to participate in individual or group activities offered by the day programme as laid down in the house rules of the penitentiary institution. 32

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a). Article 24 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) provides for solitary confinement for a period of two weeks as on order measure which the governor of a penitentiary prison can impose on a prisoner. <sup>35</sup> The governor may extend this period each time by a maximum period of two weeks if he or she concludes that the necessity for solitary confinement still exists.

Article 51 subsection 1 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) provides for confinement in a punishment cell for a maximum period of two weeks as a disciplinary punishment to be imposed by the governor of the prison. <sup>36</sup>

In the penitentiary instutions the same cells are used as punishment cells and sells for solitary confinement. <sup>37</sup>

Solitary confinement is regulated by articles 24 <sup>38</sup> and 51 <sup>39</sup> of the Penitentiary Principles Act and by the ministerial decree 'Rules punishment cel and isolation cel in penitentiary insitutution (*Regeling straf- en afzonderingscel penitentiaire inrichtingen*) <sup>40</sup> which lays down further rules concerning punishment cels and isolation cels.

- b) Between the detention regimes no differents standards concerning solitary confinement are applicable.
- c) Reports of the National Preventive mechanisms covering the years 2015<sup>41</sup> and 2016 <sup>42</sup> do no contain any information or recommendations on solitary confinement.

Article 42 subsection 1 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (Penitentiaire beginselenwet) entitles a prisoner to the care of a physician or a subsititute physician connected with the institution.<sup>43</sup> The act only mentions the psysician but the explanatory memorandum to the Penitentiary Principles Act (Penitentiaire beginselenwet) also mentions that a prisiomer should have access to a dentist and a psychiatrist connected with the institution. 44

The ministerial decree 'Regulation Model House Rules for Penitentairy Institutions' (*Regeling model huisregels penitentiaire inrichtingen*) stipulates that each penitentiary institution has a physician/general practioner, dentist and psychatrist.<sup>45</sup>

Article 42 subsection 4 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) stipulates that the governor of the instution shall provide that (a) the prisoner is provided with the drugs and diets prescribed by the physician connected with the institution; (b) the prisoner is given the treatment on the direction of the physician; (c) the prisoner is transferred to a hospital or other establishment if for the treatment prescribed by the physician. <sup>46</sup>

b). In the Dutch health care system a person with health complaints goes first to his or her general practioner who refers him or her to specialist care. This system also applies to the penitentiary institutions where prisoner go first the pysician connected to the institution. This physician will prescribe specialist care if necessary. Article 42 subsection 4 of the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) stipulates that the governor of the institution shall ensure that (a) the prisoner is provided with the drugs and diets prescribed by the physician connected with the institution; (b) the prisoner is given the treatment on the direction of the physician; (c) the prisoner is transferred to a hospital or other establishment if for the treatment prescribed by the physician. The legal framework for placing prisoners into a psychiatric hospital, addiction treatment clinic or hospital are articles 30, 31,32,33 of the ministerial regulation 'Regulation for Selection, Placement and Transfer of Prisoners' (*Regeling selectie, plaatsing en overplaatsing van gedetineerden*). 48

Article 47 of the Penitentiary Order (*Penitentiaire maatregel*) stipulates that the State shall bear the costs of medical care of the prisoner sentenced to or detained in an institution if as a compulsory insured the prisoner cannot claim benefits under the Health Insurance Act. <sup>49</sup>

- c). The Dutch penitentiary system is ruled by two acts: the Penitentiary Principles Act (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) <sup>56</sup> that applies for institutions detaining adults and the Youth Custodial Institutions Act (*Beginselenwet justitiële jeugdinrichtingen*) <sup>57</sup> that applies for institutions detaining persons held under the juvenile criminal code.

- b.) Juveniles aged 12 to 17 who commit an offence are penalised under juvenile criminal law. <sup>58</sup> The court may also apply juvenile criminal law to adults aged 18 to 22 years because on 1 April 2014 an act amending the Criminal Code and the Code of Criminal Proceedings took effect which extended the upper age limit for sentencing a young adult under juvenile criminal law to 22 years. <sup>59</sup> When minors of 16 or 17 years old are sentenced by adult criminal law, they will be detained in a Youth Custodial Institution as long as they are still a minor.
- c.)The Youth Custodial Institutions Act (*Beginselenwet justitiële jeugdinrichtingen*) differentiates between a variety of regimes addressing the special needs of the detainee.<sup>60</sup>

a). The legal framework for the maintance of order and safety in penitentiary institutions is laid down in chapter VI (articles 29-35) of the Penitentiary Principles Act. All prison staff members follow training courses at the training institute of the Custodial Institutions Agency (this the Dutch Prison Service). Training includes aggression regulation, detection of psychiatric disorders and in taking action to achieve de-escalation. These courses form part of the compulsory initial training. Some are repeated every year, others once every two years. At each penitentiary institution, prisoners are screened at arrival. At this screening an assessment will

be made whether there is a risk for fellow prisoners or for self-destructive behaviour.<sup>63</sup> Each cell is provided with an intercomsystem by which the prisoner can contact a prison officer 24 hours a day. <sup>64</sup> Each penitentiary institution has its own Supervisory Committee nominated by the Minister of Justice and Securty which, among other things, handles complaints lodged by prisoners.<sup>65</sup> The complaints procedure is laid down in chapter X1 (articles 60-68) of the Penitentiary Principles Act.<sup>66</sup>

- b). No special measures are in place to protect LGBTI prisoners. The Dutch government has stated in its latest report submitted under article 19 of the Convention against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment that prison officers and medical personnel are alert to issues related to violence against against persons because of their sexual orientation and gender but it adds that this subject has not yet been explicitly incorporated into official training or courses.<sup>67</sup>
- c). Measures to protect prisoners from violence are regulated by the following legal instruments: (*Penitentiaire beginselenwet*) <sup>68</sup>; The Penitentiary Order (*Penitentiaire maatregel*) <sup>69</sup>; Regulations on Model House Rules for Penitentairy Inistution (*Regeling model huisregels penitentiaire inrichtingen*) <sup>70</sup>; ; and Rules on requirements accomodations penal institutions' (*Regeling eisen verblijfsruimte penitentiaire inrichtingen*).<sup>71</sup>
- d.) Between the detention regimes no differents standards apply concerning the protection of prisoners.
- e.) Reports of the National Preventive mechanisms covering the years 2015<sup>72</sup> and 2016 <sup>73</sup> do no contain any special measures in place to protect prisoners from violence.

a). The Dutch Extradition Act (*Overleveringswet*) transposes the EAW Framework Decision. Article 47 of the Dutch Extradition Act (*Overleveringswet*) stipulates that the public prosecutor who issues the European Arrest Warrants shall provide the executing judicial authority with further information on request.<sup>74</sup> This means that addititional information requests about European Arrest Warrants issued by the Netherlands are handled not by one central authority. These request are handled but by the public prosecutors who issued the EAW and work at one of the 10 regional sections of the Dutch Public Prosecution Service (*Openbaar Ministerie*).

b)The Inspectorate of Justice and Security (*Inspectie Justitie en Veiligheid*) is the authority which monitors the conditions in the Netherlands and makes recommendations to improve these conditions.<sup>75</sup> For the monitoring of detention conditions it uses a special assessment framework.<sup>76</sup>

Besides the Inspectorate for Justice and Security there is the Council for the Administration of Criminal Justice and Protection of Juveniles ( *Raad voor Strafrechtstoepassing en Jeugdbescherming*). This is an independent body established by a special act.<sup>77</sup> The Council has two tasks: giving advice and administering justice. As a Court of Appeal, the Council reviews decisions made regarding persons serving a prison sentence or custodial measure: prisoners, offenders under a hospital order and juveniles in young offenders' institutions and secure youth care centres.

We want to make the following observations about the Dutch National Preventive Mechanism (NPM) and its latest reports. In the Netherlands the following bodies are designated as the National Preventive Mechanism: the Inspectorate of Justice and Security (Inspectie Justitie en veligheid) which also acts as coordinating body; the Health and Youth Care Inspectorate (Inspectie Gezondheidszorg en Jeugd); and the Council for the Administration of Criminal Justice and Protection of Juveniles (Raad voor Strafrechtstoepassing en Jeugdbescherming). The first two bodies are integral part of the national government. The Inspectorate of Justice and Security is integral part of the Ministry of Justice and Security. The Health and Youth Care Inspectorate is integral part of the Ministry of Health, Welfare and Sport. Both Inspectorates are housed with their respective ministries and are connected to them financially, logistically and in terms of supervision. The Council for the Administration of Criminal Justice and Protection of Juveniles is an independent body established by a special act. The Subcommittee on Prevention of Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment of the UN expressed expressed its concern about the autonomy of the

Dutch NPM in a report made of its first visit to the Netherlands. The Subcommittee states states that "the NPM on the whole is largely invisible. Without a separate legislative mandate, specified NPM tasks, specially allocated resources and systematic cooperation with other national and international stakeholders." <sup>78</sup> The latest reports of the Dutch NPM are very small. The latest report, covering 2016, was published in December 2017 and contains 2 pages of information on monitoring issues. <sup>79</sup>
