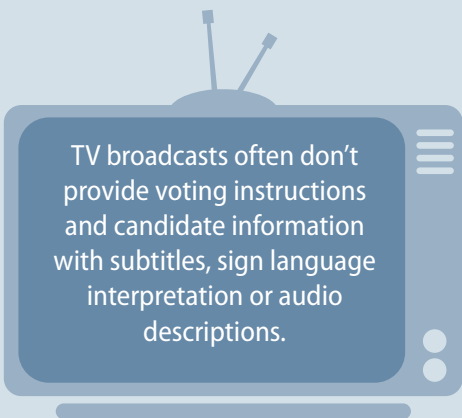

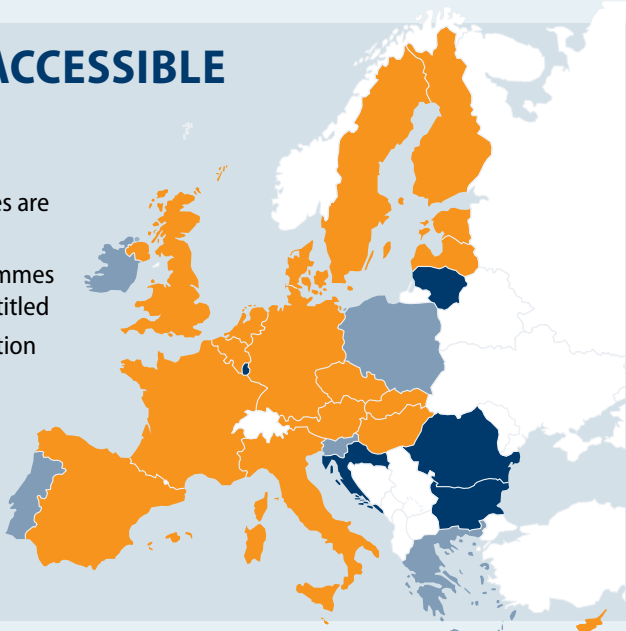
People with disabilities are more likely to be members of a political party than the general population.

MAKE TV ELECTION BROADCASTS ACCESSIBLE



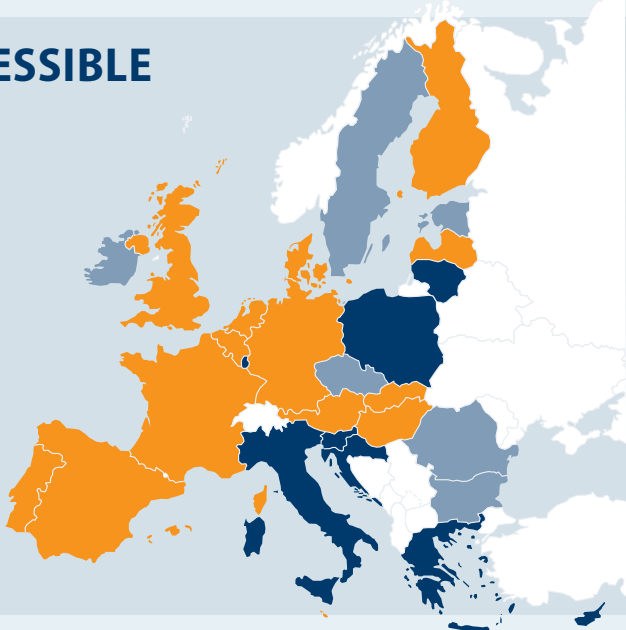

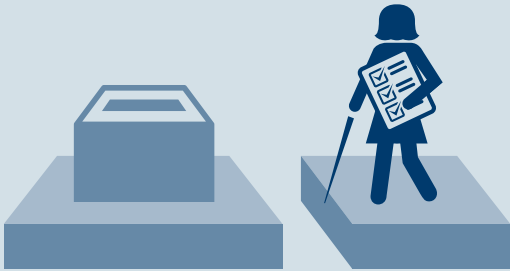
MAKE ELECTION MANIFESTOS ACCESSIBLE

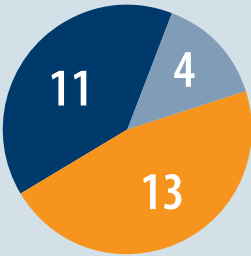


ENSURE POLLING STATIONS ARE ACCESSIBLE



Most Member States lack data on how many polling stations are accessible. Accessibility tends to focus on people in wheelchairs, rather than blind or deaf people, for example.

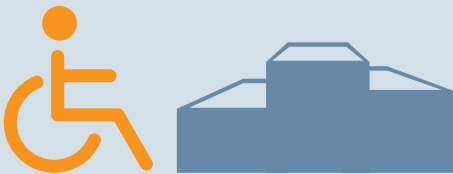

SUPPORT MPS WITH DISABILITIES



Little is known about how many people with disabilities are elected to their national parliament. Where data exists, it shows very low numbers of MPs with disabilities.
