

General population

People with disabilities living in the EU are keen to take part in political life.

On average they are more interested in politics than the general population.

But barriers to political participation remain.

GET INVOLVED IN POLICY MAKING




Not all Member States have established consultation mechanisms to involve disabled persons organisations (DPOs) when developing laws and policies that concern them.

No mechanisms in place in 4 Member States: EL, LT, NL, RO

Systematic consultation but not established by law in 11 Member States:

> BE, BG, CZ, DK, EE, FI, HR, IE, LU, LV, UK

Mechanisms established by law in 13 Member States: AT, CY, DE, ES, FR, HU, IT, MT, PL, PT, SE, SI, SK



HELP POLITICAL PARTIES MAKE MANIFESTOS ACCESSIBLE


Many parties don't provide election manifestos in accessible formats such as easy-to-read, braille, large print, or audiovisual versions.

DPOs can advise political parties on how to produce accessible manifestos.


Some political parties provided accessible manifestos No political parties provided accessible manifestos No information

No data in 11 Member States: BE, CZ, EL, FI, FR, HR, IT, LU, MT, RO, SK




Most Member States lack data on how many polling stations are accessible. Accessibility tends to focus on people in wheelchairs, rather than blind or deaf people, for example.
