Nathalie Stockwell graduated in law in Belgium (Université Catholique de Louvain – Licence en droit) and specialised in European and international law in London (Master of Laws - LLM - Queen's College, King's College and LSE). She worked at the Brussels Bar as an "avocat" on commercial and European law issues before joining the Court of Justice of the European Union in 1999. She started at the European Commission (DG Education and Culture) in 2003 where she worked as a policy officer on youth and education issues, responsible for policy initiatives and relations with the Council. This involved drafting and negotiating policy initiatives in favour of young people and close cooperation with Member States, civil society and international organisations. She also served as a policy coordinator for international relations on education with Latin America and Africa. She has been working in DG Justice and Consumers since 2011. She in particular coordinated the Commission's 2013 EU Citizenship Report and various EU publications on citizens' rights. She is, within the Unit responsible for Fundamental Rights Policies, in charge of relations with the European Union Agency for Fundamental Rights and contacts with the Council and civil society. She for example prepares Commission opinions pertaining to the FRA and drafted and negotiated the Commission proposal for FRA's 2018-2022
